If the Supervisors do not transfer the needed funds, deeper cuts will occur. Call your supervisor now! Tell him/her that the School System needs full funding. We know that people come to Fairfax County for the good schools, superior teachers, and innovative ideas. Also, Fairfax may be less attractive to new businesses if the supervisors continue to short-fund the School System.

Superintendent Dr. Karen Garza spent the last few months conducting many community listening tours, and developed the budget with input from many sources. At this point, the Board of Supervisors seems uninterested in granting the funds that will be needed because they don't want to increase taxes. Because of this, FCFT encourages everyone to call his/her local supervisor, urging you to tell your supervisor that the schools need more funds to operate effectively. STATEWIDE TORNADO DRILL

Virginia will have a tornado drill on March 11th at 9:45 a.m. The state urges everyone to participate, but if you cannot participate at that time, choose another time. The important thing is to practice tornado safety. Since 2011, 67 tornadoes have struck Virginia, affecting nearly every part of the state. On Saturday, January 11, 2014, three tornadoes struck southeastern Virginia. *Ready Virginia* has issued some tips should a tornado be seen in the area.

If a tornado warning is issued for your area, do the following quickly.

- Go to a safe place—usually the lowest level of your home, school or office. Stay there until the warning expires.
- If there is no basement, go to a windowless interior room such as a closet, bathroom, or interior hallway.
- Crouch as low as possible to the floor, facing down and covering your head with your hands.

Daylight Savings Time allows all of us to enjoy sunny summer evenings by moving our clocks ahead in the Spring. The Energy Policy Act of 2005 extended Daylight Savings Time.

It officially begins at 2 a.m. on the second Sunday of March and ends at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of November. Although Daylight Savings Time began in World War I as a way to reduce the amount of fuel consumed at night, it has always been controversial. It usually takes everyone a week or two to adjust to the new time.
